Why Traditional Organizations Can't Do This

- NAACP and NUL: These legacy organizations have become overly reliant on outdated advocacy strategies and political alignments, focusing more on identity politics than actionable community solutions. They lack the grassroots engagement and adaptability needed to address modern challenges.

Other Black Conservative Organizations:

- Frederick Douglass Freedom Alliance: Primarily a political arm with limited capacity for community-driven programs.
- BLEXIT: A strong advocacy movement but lacking the infrastructure for long-term, localized empowerment.
- Project 21: Focuses on policy papers and national discussions rather than direct community action.

IFCA's unique model combines grassroots mobilization, education, principled leadership, and scalable impact, making it the only organization equipped to replace legacy institutions effectively.

The Time is Now to Re-Evaluate the NAACP and the NUL

Recent political shifts have energized black voters to reconsider long-standing political allegiances with the "Democratic plantation," and subsequently with those organizations that have aligned themselves and their goals with the progressive left. This has created opportunities for engagement based on individual freedom and empowerment. The IFCA (Institute for Family and Community Advancement) seeks to sustain and amplify this momentum by fostering a comprehensive, community-driven mindset that transforms these challenges that face blacks into opportunities for growth.

This is a historic moment to replace outdated, ideologically entrenched organizations like the NAACP (National Association for the Advancement of Colored People) and NUL (National Urban League). These traditional groups have grown disconnected from the immediate needs of black communities, relying on outdated strategies and political loyalties rather than actual results. With your support, IFCA can lead this transformation and establish itself as the cornerstone of a new, principled approach to Black empowerment.

Throughout history, many Black organizations, including the NAACP, NUL, and historically Black colleges and Universities (HBCUs), were founded and sustained with significant support from progressive white leaders and donors (as an example, two founders of the NAACP were black, while five of the seven founders were white progressives).



While the efforts of these groups did indeed help lay the foundations for critical advancements in civil rights, desegregation of the military and the fight for unsegregated education (brought about by collaboration with Republican legislators and presidents), the current state of African American families indicate that these very same organizations have sadly since fallen short of achieving true independence for African Americans and have instead encouraged a black cultural and community dependence on government handouts for daily sustenance. The model of the independent African American that Frederick Douglass envisioned has been replaced, resulting in the NAACP and the NUL now spending a sizeable portion of their efforts on redirecting taxpayer funds from other segments of the population to African Americans. History records these sorts of societies as fiefdoms and feudal systems where dukes and earls have been replaced by lobbyists, societies and elected representatives. And as a result we see black literacy rates as low as 17%, through the roof, black homicide, crime, gang and incarceration rates and the determiner of societies' failure – fatherlessness, at over 72%. All of these are sadly a direct consequence of “government help.”

So today, we invite you to build a legacy that actually will deliver. — one that builds upon those past successes of the civil rights laws, desegregation and equality, but shifts toward a principled, values-driven approach that empowers families and strengthens communities for generations to come.

The goal of IFCA is to create an independent African American population that does not depend on the whims of those in power for their success, one that mirrors the successes of recent African Immigrants who do far better in America than even most native born whites.

Potential Core Partners: Collaborate with trusted groups like Frederick Douglass Freedom Alliance and Moms for Liberty to build strong local networks.

Empowering Communities Locally: Bring together existing organizations to strengthen and amplify their efforts within six key focus areas:

1. Economic Empowerment: Provide financial literacy classes, entrepreneurship, small business programs, and job training to foster self-reliance and self-sufficiency.
2. Education: Advocate for school choice and partner with homeschooling networks to support parental involvement to raise the literacy rate from 17% where it is now to above where it was in the 1930's (70%)
